

International learning and teaching adaptive management in Eberswalde

University lecturers from three Balkans countries visit the Centre for Ecomics and Ecosystem Management and Eberswalde University for Sustainable Development for an exchange about teaching adaptive conservation management.

This year's course is organised by Dr. Stefan Kreft, Lena Strixner and Daniela Aschenbrenner, Centre for Ecomics and Ecosystem Management.

The action is thought to improve teaching at the universities in terms of introducing new topics into curricula, such as application of geographic information systems or adaptive transboundary nature conservation in the context of nature conservation and sustainable development.

Another aim is enhancing students' skills in strategic project management by teaching topics in a project-oriented way.

In Eberswalde teaching adaptive conservation management was introduced in 2004 by Pierre Ibisch. Originally, it was based on the methodology *Conservation Action Planning*; later on, the NGO *Foundations of Success* supported the introduction of the method Open Standards for the Practice of Conservation. The module is based on the analysis of and planning for a concrete region. This year, again, the scope is Barnim county, where the centre conducts a real-life project about landscape framework planning (in cooperation with the county's administration).
